



2007/2008 Criminal Offence Declaration

Starting Monday May 14, 2007 The Human Resources Department launches the 4th Annual "iCOD" (Internet Criminal Offence Declaration) Process to all TCDSB Employees, under Ontario Regulation 521/01, for the "2007/2008" School Year

The Board's "iCOD", Internet Criminal Offence Declaration website will be available for all employees to complete and submit their required offence declaration for the 2007/2008 school year.

As a reminder to all employees, the Ontario Regulation 521/01 requires all school boards to collect offence declarations from all employees by each September 1. All employees are required to make an annual offence declaration. Failure to do so may result in suspension or termination of employment.

The iCOD website is highly secure, private and confidential. Employees may access this website in the privacy of their homes, at their place of work or at a public library through any web browser that supports a minimum <u>128-bit</u> encryption.

The iCOD site will be available starting Monday May 14, 2007 through to August 31, 2007. However, we are asking all school based employees to complete their offence declaration by June 30, 2007. Employees may access iCOD through the following links:

Tips to Note Before Logging On To iCOD:

For those employees that do remember your **iCOD password** from last June's offence declaration process, all you have to do is sign onto iCOD and complete this year's 2007/08 offence declaration.

For those employees that do not remember their **"iCOD password**" from last June's offence declaration process, as well as any new employees that did not participate in the 2006/07 process, please refer to the upper right hand corner of your payslip for "iCOD registration information." You will need to refer to this information when accessing iCOD to register and complete your declaration.

Connect to : <u>https://icod.tcdsb.org</u>. You must register as a "new user".

Once you are in the "Registration for New User" screen, you will be asked to enter a password in a field called "User Password". This password does not have to be a TCDSB password that you may currently be using for other TCDSB applications. iCOD is a totally separate system, independent from any other TCDSB application. Create your own password for iCOD and privately document this number in your personal belongings.

An iCOD userid will be provided to you by the iCOD application once you have registered. Remember this userid; store it with your iCOD password that you created.

Once you have registered in iCOD, you must continue in the application with the "declaration process".

PERMITS FOR SCHOOL FUNCTIONS

SCHOOL YEAR 2007-2008 TCDSB POLICY B.R.05

TCDSB Principals are required to submit permit applications for all **pre-scheduled school events or meetings** (i.e. parent-teacher interviews, school council meetings, school dances, school anniversaries, team practices, etc.) for the 2007-2008 school year by JULY 6, 2007.

A permit is required for any event taking place after 6:00 p.m. Monday through Friday and for any part of the day on Saturday, Sunday and holidays.

This will ensure that these school functions are part of the Permits Calendar before any permits are approved for non-school organizations, as outlined in Policy B.R. 05.

Principals are also reminded about Item #1 in TCDSB Regulations for School Permits:

"Minimum of ten (10) days advance notice is required before a permit can be issued. This ten day notice applies to ALL."

HISTORY

DESCRIPTION OF AWARD

This bursary will be awarded annually to a graduating student who requires financial assistance in order to pursue studies at university or college. The annual amount of the award will be \$500.

CRITERIA

Awards from the TCSBECU Bursary Fund will be made by the Board of Directors of The Angel Foundation for Learning to a Grade 12 student who is currently attending a TCDSB secondary school. Selection of the recipient will be made by a committee composed of representatives from the TCSBECU and The Angel Foundation for Learning Board of Directors and will be based on the following criteria:

- 'B' average or higher
- Financial need
- Overall contribution to the school and community
- Acceptance into a post-secondary institution

Preference will be given to applicant whose parent/guardian is a member of TCSBEUC.

APPLICATION PROCESS For each application the following is required:

- A completed application form
- A letter of application from the student
- A letter of recommendation from the school principal or designate which outlines contributions to the school and community and which states the nature of the financial need (Please include as much detail as appropriate)
- Evidence of acceptance into a post-secondary institution

SELECTION PROCESS

All applications must be forwarded by the school to the Executive Director, The Angel Foundation for Learning before **Friday**, **May 25**, **2007**. The Selection Committee will review all applications and make a decision regarding the recipient of the award by the end of the second week in June.

Do you have a colleague who provides exceptional service to students who are blind or visually impaired? Do you know someone who provides resources or support services that enhance the lives of students who are blind or visually impaired? TAKE THIS OPPORTUNITY TO HONOUR THEIR CONTRIBUTIONS!!!!!!

Awards Available:

Excellence in Teaching: The recipient of this award shall be an individual who is engaged in direct service to students who are blind or visually impaired and whose service, innovative approach, and dedication have been outstanding in the field of education of students who are blind or visually impaired.

Distinguished Service Award: The recipient of this award shall be an individual who is indirectly involved in activities which substantially benefit or contribute to the education of students who are blind or visually impaired. The intent of this award is to acknowledge and celebrate those in administrative positions, university professors, braille transcribers, etc.

These awards are open to anyone who works in providing service to Canadian students who are blind or visually impaired.

How will recipients be chosen? A selection panel, made up of members from the field of visual impairments, will select the winners. The panel will assess nominations on how closely they meet the category criteria.

- serves with long standing dedication to students who are blind or visually impaired
- contributes to innovation or creative programs for students who are blind or visually impaired
- sees the ability in every student and encourages students to see ability within themselves
- contributes to a collaborative teaching and learning environment
- supports, facilitates, and promotes continuous professional learning in the field
- sets high standards and helps others reach them
- enhances the lives of students who are blind or visually impaired

How do I nominate someone?

- 1. Complete the nomination form. Attach a nomination letter outlining how the candidate meets the selection criteria (not to exceed 3 pages). Letters must contain an original signature.
- 2. Collect letters of support from two other people (not to exceed 2 pages), including original signatures.
- 3. Get the nominees permission.
- 4. Submit the entire package by the **deadline of September 14, 2007.**

What information should be included in the nomination letter?

Your letter should give reasons for nominating this person, supported by clear examples. Nomination letters should not exceed 3 pages in length (12 point font). In writing this letter you may wish to consider the following:

Why should this person be selected for this award?

How does this person demonstrate their dedication to students, staff and/or community?

What innovative practices have they contributed to further student learning?

How does this person demonstrate their belief that every student can learn and how do they foster this belief in others?

How does this individual contribute to a professional, collaborative teaching and learning environment?

In what ways has this person enhanced the lives of students who are blind or visually impaired?

Letters of support should be written by someone who has direct experience or knowledge of the nominee's contributions. Support letters should provide clear evidence and examples that demonstrate how the nominee meets the selection criteria. Support letters should not exceed 2 typed pages (12 point font).

Meagan's Walk hoping for banner year

More that 2,000 origami paper cranes landed at the front of the Hospital for Sick Children today as a sign of hope and well-wishing for healing, but the founder of the walk has a wish of her own.

"I'm hoping this will be our million dollar year," said Denise Bebenek, Meagan's mom and founder of the walk. "We are so ready to go the next level." So far Meagan's Walk has raised \$800,000 for the Sick Kids Hospital.

The ceremony is the annual kick-off to Meagan's Walk, a memorial walk dedicated to Meagan Bebenek who died in 2001 from an inoperable brain tumour. The cranes are symbolic of an old Japanese tradition, and the ceremony was created at Meagan's school, Our Lady of Sorrows, before she died.

"Our theme is kids helping kids," said Bebenek. She said the ceremony showcased the origami cranes created by students at Our Lady of Sorrows, and another local school St. Raphael.

"The message of Meagan's Walk is that these kids need not journey alone," said Bebenek.

When Meagan died in 2001, the Bebenek family received an outpouring of support, which translated into large amounts of money raised for the Hospital for Sick Children. By the spring, Bebenek knew she wanted to do more and decided to organize a walk in her daughter's memory.

The only day that street permits were available for the walk was on Mother's Day. Undeterred, Bebenek saw it as a sign. "What a wonderful day to celebrate our gifts," said Bebenek. Her vision in creating the walk was to culminate the event with a human chain around the hospital, to "hug" all the children inside. "The message of Meagan's walk is that these children need not journey alone," said Bebenek.

Kids are involved in all aspects of the walk. From the Samba Kidz, who will lead the walk on May 13, to the hundreds of high school aged volunteers who are earning their community hours, children are not only getting the message, they are disseminating, said Bebenek. "It's unbelievable how many volunteers we have," said Bebenek.

While last year she had ambitions of extending the walk across the country, this year she's decided to bring it back home. "Every city in the world could use a hug," she said. "But we want to reach out to this community."

Students learn about safety on the Internet

Officers with the OPP's Project P. child pornography unit had an ominous warning for their boss about his 16-year-old granddaughter when he came for a visit. To prepare for their appoint-

To prepare for their appointment with Community Safety and Correctional Services Minister Monte Kwinter (York Centre), investigators quickly gathered information the teenager had posted about herself online.

While the details seemed innocuous – she talked about school and the activities she enjoyed – officers explained how predators could use the information to falsely befriend the girl and eventually lure her into a dangerous situation.

AVOID DANGERS

Kwinter used the personal incident as he launched a new province-wide Internet safety program at Scarborough's The Divine Infant Catholic School Monday.

"More and more, our children are using the Internet to learn about their world. But at the same time, they are putting themselves at risk,"

he said. "We're teaching kids how to avoid the dangers of the Internet."

The government spent \$1 million to develop the new Air Dogs program aimed at Grade 7 and 8 students. The software includes interactive games dealing with issues such as cybertheft, extortion, bullying and Internet juring.

The program will be available in classrooms throughout Ontario in September. Education Minister Kathleen

Education Minister Kathleen Wynne (Don Valley West) called the program a comprehensive classroom tool that will help bridge the generation gap between children and adults.

"None of us grew up with this technology. That's why it's important we have these tools," she said.

The government also gave a \$250,000 grant to the Kids' Internet Safety Alliance, an organization dedicated to eliminating the online sexual exploitation of children and youth.

WARN CHILDREN

The funding will be used to develop programs with other partners aimed at making youngsters and their parents more savvy about online surfing, vice-chair Paul Gillespie said.

"We used to warn our children about strangers, (not) getting into cars. The vehicle has now changed. The steering wheel is the mouse and the gas pedal is the keyboard," said Gillespie, who spent six years leading the Toronto Police Service's child exploitation section.

The Internet has opened up a seedy world that used to exist only on the fringes of society by providing pedophiles with anonymity, acceptance and easy access, he said. But despite the dangers, Gillespite

But despite the dangers, Gillespic said many parents remain oblivious to the risks their children face online.

Because attempts to inform them have proven unsuccessful so far, he said the funding will be used to develop new strategies.

develop new strategies. If that means taking drastic steps, such as pressuring companies to host mandatory information sessions for employees or visiting summer camps, Gillespie said the alliance is willing to do it.

"This is money very well spent," he added.

Memorial blood donor clinic honours teacher Popular Fr. John Redmond faculty member lives on 'in her students'

Liliana Dicintio (Venturo) was a newlywed, a young high school religion and French teacher

gion and French teacher who revelled in organizing the Etobicoke school's fashion shows and spending time with her close-knit family and friends.

Then, one March day in 2002 as she was driving her mom home after knee surgery, the 27-year-old couldn't move her arm. They called 911.

called 911. (Venturo) Within two days, Lili was diagnosed with Thrombotic Mr. Thrombocytopenic Purpura (TTP), scl a rare blood disorder. The autoimmune disorder is often caused by Aw loss of an enzyme which leads to Wo

low platelet counts, and deregulation of the body's blood clotting and bleeding leading to small clots on the brain and kidneys.

Lili battled TTP for two months

of platelets daily, treatment known as plasma exchange. While TTP has a survival rate of about 90 per cent, sadly, Lili wasn't in the majority. Lili died May 10, 2002, eight months after her wedding, weeks after celebrating her 28th birthday in hospital.

years later, that isn't the case. And she'll live on, in her students," said Lill's mom, Franca Venturo.

FIR religion teacher and chaplaincy team leader Sal Badali organized what is the third annual memorial blood drive.

"Lili had a beautiful smile, and she just seemed to really love working with the kids," Badali said." It hought, what a fitting way to remember Lili who died of a blood disorder and loved teaching than to encourage the kids to give blood and to help others."

Public blood donations to Canadian Blood Services made Lili's treatment possible, and gave her two last months with her family.

"At least we know she was given every chance. We'll be eternally grateful for that," Venturo said. "That people were able to help her with blood is a gift itself. If now we can help someone else, that's something."

During a plasma exchange, a patient's plasma — with high amounts of an antibody — is separated from his or her red blood cells, and replaced with blood bank (donated) plasma containing a normally functioning enzyme and decreased amounts of antibody. Red blood cells are then returned to the patient's bloodstream. Plasma exchange is among the greatest demands for blood.

"Each time plasma exchange happens, you'll need anywhere between 15 to 20 donations," said Dr. Ben Saxon, CBS's medical director, central Ontario region. "It's a big event."

Saxon said CBS has "very good" plasma supplies, which are frozen, and as such, have a longer shelf life than other blood components. Yet, the need for plasma in rare blood types, like AB, can put a strain on the system, he said. However, blood donations are always needed.

"On average, every minute someone in Canada requires blood or a

blood product," Saxon said. Five years after Lili's death, Venturo says her daughter is remembered by her husband's parents and sister Rose, her sister Marylou and husband. Tony, her grandmother, and her many friends who still call or write the family.

or write the family. The Liliana Dicintio Religion Education Award, sponsored by the Dicintio and Venturo families, is given annually to the Father John Redmond student that demonstrates Lilis life-giving qualities of "Christian values reflected through participation in his or her religious education classes.

The school's motto, "Cursum Consumavi Fidem Servavi — I have finished the race; I have kept the faith," Lili reflected in everything she did, her mom said.

"She was so generous," Venturo said of her youngest daughter, the grief still close in her eyes and voice. "She loved her friends. If you gave her a rock, she'd cherish it like a diamond. She appreciated and loved her husband (Frank) and family so much. She was like a butterfly, always flitting around."

Empowered students made their presence known in a thunderous endof-year awards celebration for students, teachers and police officers involved in the largest school safety program in the nation.

The Empowered Students Partnership (ESP) showcase at the Liberty Grand on May 1 brought out hundreds of students, staff advisors and officers to recognize the best ways students keep their schools safe. All the schools showed off their work through educational displays at the showcase event.

"The leadership of young people in this great city is making a difference," Chief Blair said, of the programs created with the

commitment, enthusiasm and dedication of students. Schools participating in the ESP program form committees of students, staff advisors and police officers who create programs, education campaigns and events designed to make their schools and communities safer.

St. Mary's Catholic Secondary School was named outstanding ESP school of the year for their work that included anti-bullying, cyber bullying campaigns and events to bring students together with teachers, staff and police officers.

"Many students have developed better relationships with police officers," said ESP committee member Felicia Guthrie, 18. She said her school has become safer because of the close relationship between students and officers. "It's opened students to talking about their problems with staff members and police officers."

Mayor David Miller told the hundreds of students that their work is a valuable crime prevention tool. "Toronto is a safe city but we deserve an even safer city," Mayor Miller said. "Safety is about law enforcement and about preventing crime before it happens."

He said ESP gives youth a voice and a chance to bring important ideas to the table often reserved for adults only. "Young people in Toronto know what's needed in their neighbourhoods."

Other schools and students were honoured for their work, including creating an anti-violence documentary, a nutrition program and drinking and driving education campaigns.

ESP now operates in 110 schools across the city.






