Jurisdictions included the Maryland counties of Anne Arundel, Carroll, Frederick, Howard, Montgomery and Prince George's; and the Virginia counties of Albemarle, Fairfax and Prince William, and the City of Fredericksburg.



Counseling Corner, June 2014

A s the year comes to a close the counselors would like to thank all the parents, staff and students that have supported us this year, and recognize the accomplishments of the students at Oakton as well. We are proud to be a part of the life of such a vibrant school community. The Graduation ceremony on the 19th of June marks a milestone in the lives of our seniors as they embark on the next phase of their academic and personal journeys. From the Halls of Government

The Fourth Quarter was a busy one for all Government students as they completed their "Active Citizenship Projects." The goal of the Active Citizenship Project is to meet the civic mission of public education and prepare students for a life of responsible citizenship. Students were given many options to complete this project including the Senior Capstone Project done with their Learning Seminars, a Democracy Activities Portfolio and Face to Faith – a program supported by the Tony Blair Foundation. Students chose a topic in which they have a strong interest, learned about the issue, educated their peers and the larger community and then acted on the problem. In many cases, students worked with knowledgeable experts beyond Oakton High School. Additionally, all students were asked to complete a written reflection and participate in a Senior Exit Interview where they discussed the answer to the question, "As an Oakton High School graduate, how am I prepared to be an informed, ethical, and engaged citizen of the world?" This pilot program was the precursor to the fully implemented Capstone experience that all students will have beginning in 2014-2015.
