Verses 11 and 12 read, "And they shall teach every man his neighbour, and every man his brother saying, Know the Lord: for all shall know me, from the least to the greatest. 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Editorials

Who is thankful for you? Perhaps that is a rather abrupt way to begin this editorial, and if taken personally, a rather disturbing, and hopefully, a thought-provoking question. In Romans 16:3-4, the apostle Paul writes, "Greet Priscilla and Aquila my helpers in Christ Jesus: Who have for my life laid down their own necks: unto whom not only I give thanks, but also all the churches of the Gentiles." Exactly how Priscilla and Aquila had risked their lives for Paul and the churches of the Gentiles is not clear, but it is evident that Paul had not forgotten it. But his being thankful had required a sacrifice on their part. Any relationship of worth is going to cost time, effort, stress, and self-sacrifice on your part. In some way, and in various degrees, you will have to be willing to risk your reputation if anyone is truly thankful for you.

In Philippians 1:3 the apostle Paul wrote, "I thank my God upon every remembrance of you." The Phillipian saints must have been a very special people to Paul. They also must have been in a unique category if every time Paul thought of them he thanked God for them.

There are many things that must be done in order to get into that elite group of being appreciated, but one thing to consider is that we should always have a disposition of being helpful without being obtrusive, meddlesome, or patronizing. Perhaps you can think of someone in your life who not only wanted to help you, but wanted to know everything about you, and before you could bring things to a halt you were feeling owned. If you have experienced it, as I am sure most everyone has, then you should have a conviction of not being that way to others.

Healthy relationships are built on love. That is how God won a place in our hearts, by loving us so much that He gave His only begotten Son. But love is not of much significance unless it is free of self. God did not give Christ to a cruel cross just because of what He could gain from us, but because He had such pity for the plight we were in that He felt a kinship. In other words, He was able to put Himself in our shoes. People are thankful for love that is not tainted with personal ambition.

A sympathetic person is an appreciated person. There are many heart-aches in the world, and if you want to be a sympathetic person there are many opportunities for you to spend time in lending an ear and a heart. Being "there" for someone in time of distress is an excellent way to be remembered. But keep something in mind, don't be gushy. If you overdo sympathy the person may wonder just how sincere you really are.

I am sure there are other things that you could add to this list, but let me end by saying that everyone needs to learn where the fine line between counsel and advice is, and it will change with every situation. No one likes to feel smothered with advice, but we all like the fresh air of freedom of thought. Every decent human being will soak up loving counsel, but don't be surprised if you feel a repulsion when doling out advice.

Maybe it would be good to stop and consider the question again, "Who is thankful for you?" Perhaps you can see ways to change your mode of dealing with others, especially those close to you. It still isn't too late to be remembered with thankfulness.

Due to the poor condition of the structure, it cannot be considered much of a loss, but it will cause some inconvenience. Question and Answer by Ostis B. Wilson

Question: I would like for you to explain Isaiah 4:1, "And in that day seven women shall take hold of one man. . . ."

Answer: The full text of Isaiah 4: I reads thus: "And in that day seven women shall take hold of one man, saying, We will eat our own bread, and wear our own apparel: only let us be called by thy name, to take away our reproach." I will first refer to Adam Clarke on this text. He says that this verse belongs with the last two verses of Chapter 3 which read, "Thy men shall fall by the sword, and thy mighty in the war. And her gates shall lament and mourn; and she being desolate shall sit upon the ground." He says that this is describing a great destruction and desolation in Jerusalem (her and she) and Judea with the number of slain in battle being so great that seven women shall be left to one man. He quotes from Kimchi who says that this took place in the days of Ahaz, when Pekah the son of Remaliah slew one hundred and twenty thousand men of Judea in one day. (II Chron. 28:6). Jeremiah describes such a situation in Jeremiah 15:8, "Their widows are increased to me above the sand of the seas: ... "Adam Clarke's application of this text is totally literal.

However, there are many texts connected with the history of Israel which have a two-fold meaning applying first to Israel after the flesh and then finding a spiritual fulfillment in Israel after the Spirit (spiritual Israel, or New Testament saints; the Church). I feel that this is one of those prophetic texts which applies to both literal and spiritual Israel, and that we have a condition equivalent to this right before our eyes today in modern Christendom(?).

First, let us consider that we are looking at a very desperate situation here when the male population is so depleted by war that there are seven women to every man. But even so, it indicates a great depth of moral degeneracy when women are willing to share the rights of marriage with several other women in order to have a man whose name they bear and refer to as their husband. They were willing to eat their own bread and wear their own apparel (work and support themselves) if they could just be called by a man's name as their husband. This is surely a low degree of moral degeneracy. Also, the women were willing to take the initiative and do the soliciting and courting in

this case which was totally taboo in their society. This is a really desperate situation.

In the New Testament, the Church of God is referred to as a woman, and not only a woman but a bride, "the bride, the Lamb's wife" (Rev. 21:9). Revelation 21:10 refers to her as "that great city, the holy Jerusalem, descending out of heaven from God." This is that spiritual Jerusalem from above which Paul refers to in Galatians 4:26 as "the mother of us all." This holy Jerusalem is a woman, also a wife, also a mother with childrenmany of them. Read the following texts which confirm this: II Cor. 11:2; Eph. 5:22-33; Rev. 19:7-8; Rev. 21:2, 9-10, also these texts speaking prophetically of the Church: Isa. 61:10-11; 54:5-10; 66:7-14. All of these texts refer to Christ and His love and blessings for the Church, His Bride.

But there are many human institutions in the world today called churches and they are depicted in the Scriptures as women also. In Revelation 17 we have a description of a woman which is called in verse 1, "the great whore that sitteth upon many waters." In verses 3 and 4 she is called "a woman" and "the woman," and a description of her vileness is given. The description is given of her as riding upon a scarlet-colored beast having seven heads and ten horns (verse 3 and 7), and in verse 9 the seven heads are identified with seven mountains on which the woman sitteth: this all sums up to a description identifying the city of Rome. It was situated upon seven hills and it had seven kings or seven different forms of government as described inverse 10. Verse 12 identifies the ten horns as ten kings which had not yet received a kingdom, but these did receive kingdoms in the decline and fall of the Roman Empire when it broke up into ten minor kingdoms. The waters upon which the woman sat is described in verse 15 as "peoples, multitudes, and nations, and tongues." With all this description before us we have this woman clearly identified as the Roman Catholic church. But that is not all, she was a mother of daughters who were harlots, too. (Verse 5). These daughters represent the multiplicity of Protestant denominations which have come out of but have their roots in the Mother Church of Rome.

It is a case of "like mother, like daughter," They are all (mother and daughters) human institutions governed by men through boards, synods, conferences, presbyters, etc., and all sailing under the banners of their own creeds, disciplines, and the like. There is not a single one of them which takes the whole Word of God for its creed, because to do so would entirely destroy and obliterate its God-dishonoring sect. The Word of God lays a strong indictment against the entire sectarian, denominational system.

Wait a minute now. You say, "What does all of this have to do with Isaiah 4:1 and how does it apply?" The answer to that question is easy and clear. All these women from the mother (Roman Catholicism) on down through the daughters (Protestant denominations) are nominally Christian and take hold on Christ and want to be called by His name to take away the reproach of their spiritual fornication. They eat their own breadtheir own doctrines of men which they mill out in their theological seminaries and their own beliefs whether scriptural or not. One of our brethren asked a member of one denomination if they practiced feet-washing in that church. The answer was, "no." Then the brother asked why. The answer was, "Because it is not in our discipline." The brother read him the description and command for this ordinance from the Scriptures. He still insisted it as not in their manual so they did not practice it. Then the brother asked if they would practice the ordinance if it were in their manual. He agreed that they would in such a case. This is a simple, isolated illustration of this point, but shows clearly how they "eat their own bread." This is true in many other points and doctrines which I do not have space here to go into. They also wear their own apparel—self-righteousness, salvation through their own good works, church membership, and benevolent and charitable deeds, etc.

In the first 12 verses of Revelation 11, we have a clear picture of God's two witnesses in the earth and their activities, their death, and their resurrection. These two witnesses are God's Word and God's Spirit. They are the two vicars of the Son of God in His Church on earth. For 1260 years they are featured as having a limited prophecy in sackcloth. This was during the reign of the Mother (Catholicism), and it was true that the Word and Spirit had a limited operation during this time but, there were many, many saints who did not identify with the human system of Catholicism but remained separate unto God and worshiped Him in Spirit and in Truth. They paid with their lives, but were true and faithful to the Word and Spirit anyway.

In verse 7 the Mother's daughters (Protestant denominations) came on the scene and took the prominent place in the religious world, and through them the two witnesses (Word and Spirit) were slain and put clear out of operation. This was true because under denominationalism in those early days there were great religious awakenings and "earth shaking" revivals and the true people of God who had been standing separate and clear during the reign of the Mother were now drawn into this system because they saw the spiritual manifesta-

tions of it. But these were all human institutions, too, operating under their own programs and man-made doctrines instead of giving God's Word and Spirit free course among them. Consequently, during that time when there was no separate body of people who worshiped God in Spirit and in Truth only, the two witnesses are represented as being killed.

Note in verses 8 and 9, they let their dead bodies lie in the street and would not permit them to be buried in graves. Say to any of these people who exalt their disciplines above the plain Word of God, "Well, we don't go by the Bible anyway so let us just throw it away and go on with our disciplines," they will immediately remonstrate against that and class you as a reprobate for suggesting such a thing even though it does not mean all that much to them. In other words, they are saying, "We will eat our own bread and go by our own rules and creeds, but let us hold onto our Bibles to give a degree of credibility to what we are doing."

Then we see in verse 10 how the people made merry and sent gifts one to another while the two witnesses were dead. They could do this and feel comfortable and find pleasure in it because the Word was not condemning them and the Spirit could not convict them ("torment them") because He only works in conjunction with the Word. There is a great deal of having a form of godliness but denying the power thereof in these days. And this is manifest in people who are nominally Christian (holding onto Christ and naming His name to take away their reproach), but are going on "eating their own bread," "wearing their own apparel," and doing their own thing in their own way nonetheless.

Rejoice Evermore

The natural man feels he can only rejoice while the sun is shining in his life. Yet, God knows that our hearts would become dried out and hard with continual sun and no rain. God in His infinite wisdom, sends rain and sometimes permits severe storms in our life to keep our hearts soft and pliable in His hands.

Let your mind call to remembrance some past problem that caused you to mightily call upon God. Can you not remember God's loving, almighty hand, leading you so unerringly to the final solution? Remember the times God reminded you to hold fast to His hand, and look to Him rather than the circumstances? No doubt God also reminded you to let your requests be made known "by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving." (Phil. 4:6).

God's great Father-heart yearns toward His trusting children. When He sees them seeking for His perfect will to be wrought in their lives with their hearts full of trust and faith and thanksgiving, God's great heart is moved to work "exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think according to the power that worketh in us." (Eph. 3:20.)

Dear ones, I challenge you to give thanks to God and rejoice and "be strong in the Lord, and in the power of His might." (Eph. 6:10). When we call to remembrance God's past blessings, we have no doubt of God's great love and almighty power manifested to us. Our hearts should swell within us with rejoicing and love and thanksgiving.

God is also pleased when we learn to "count it all joy when we fall into divers temptations." (James 1:2). God wants us to learn to be joyful even in the midst of trial. The apostle Paul learned to be content in whatever state he was in. Not only did he learn contentment, but he learned to rejoice. "Rejoice in the Lord alway: and again I say, Rejoice." (Phil. 4:4). Rejoicing in the Lord will bring peace. "And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." Phil. 4:7.

In the fifth chapter of I Thessalonians, we are told, "the day of the Lord so cometh as a thief in the night. . . . Therefore let us not sleep as do others; but let us watch and be sober." Further in that chapter, we are given several exhortations: "Rejoice evermore. Pray without ceasing. In every thing give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you. Quench not the Spirit. Despise not prophesyings. Prove all things; hold fast that which is good. Abstain from all appearance of evil."

Here is a very solemn question: Were the Israelites able to enter into the land of Canaan after they had murmured and complained so much? No! God didn't count them worthy, so His great plan for them was marred.

That brings us again to the verse, "My brethren, count it all joy when ye fall into divers temptations." The following verses explain very clearly how we can "count it all joy." "Knowing this, that the trying of your faith worketh patience." Patience is a word that we shy away from, nevertheless, patience is essential. The next verse reads: "But let patience have her perfect work, that ye may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing." James 1:2-4.

Now we can better understand why God wants us to "rejoice evermore." He is wanting us to look at the end result of our trials and temptations, realizing that God is taking dross out of our lives. He is making and molding us into His own glorious image. This is cause for rejoicing. We can't take the dross out of our lives, even if we see and know our short-comings and weaknesses. We need to be honest with ourselves—it takes the hard trials and temptations to make us what we should be. The apostle Paul wrote "... Is it a reliable company? How about dividends? Character of employer, kind of work, length of hours in proportion to wages? All these are vital questions and to be considered in any contemplated position.

There is one vocation that is the greatest work of all, and requires the best preparation of all, its wages are steady and ample and its final rewards and future prospects are beyond words to tell. We are talking of the position of motherhood and its rich, permanent and satisfying compensations.

In this work as in no other, woman joins hand with God in a divine partnership. He is the silent partner and the great paymaster. He it is who has ordained and provided in every way for this first and greatest of all institutions—the home.

It is possible, in our day, that our fine sense of the responsibility of motherhood is being lost and the present neglect of training our children is a result of not realizing their value. Have our children ever heard us say, "If it were not for the baby, I could enjoy this or that, or I could earn money and have things like other women, or I would not need to work so hard?" as if this jewel of priceless worth were a handicap or an incumbrance? Oh, I rather should think the angels in heaven would look down with envy upon us mothers, to whom are intrusted these little ones straight from the hand of God!

The mother of Moses heard the words, "Take this child and nurse him for me and I will give thee thy wages." She did a greater thing than train Moses for Pharoah's daughter, she trained him for God. And oh, God is a great paymaster. Riches? Treasures? Yes, all that a man hath will he give for his child gladly.

We know these children are of immeasurable worth. We know ours is but a stewardship and we must render up an account at the end of life's day.
