Hints From The Dog House with Brendan Butler, Oakfield Kelpies

Temperament

In the last couple of months I have discussed the ramifications of having a young dog, the trouble they can brew if left unchecked and a couple of well-known strategies, notably using the tone of our voice to indicate our affection or displeasure, and our body language.

This time we'll look at why our young work dog would want to go and terrorise our pet lambs or why it would want to rip every thing in the house to pieces. In a young litter of pups you will see early on the differing temperaments. Some will want to jump all over you, another might be standoffish and shy and there might be a dominant, more aggressive pup, or a sleepy bigger

boned dopey pup.

Obviously the different styles and temperaments of the puppy that will suit us will vary, but the young dogs' tendencies will give us a good clue as to what we are looking for in a mature dog. In a work dog the big boned dopey pup will probably be slower maturing than the smaller busy pup but develop into a calmer, steadier paddock style with bigger presence on the stock. The aggressive, busy pup will often end up making a better forcing dog because they tend to work closer and harder on the stock. When looking at obtaining a new puppy it is worth studying closely the temperament of the pups because usually it can give a good indication of what they will turn out like.

Tooraweenah Management Committee (TMC) news: Chair Geoff Pike has retired. Current members are Jeff Finn, Bev Pike, Patty Webb, Ash Jenkin and Ben Gale. Lester Thurston will join the committee as an alternate delegate when any member is

unable to attend meetings scheduled every three months. Newly elected chair is Daryl Colwell, Gilgandra Shire Council's Director of Infrastructure, (Engineer).

The TMC Charter is: "To ensure the maintenance and beautification of Tooraweenah is planned and carried out, together with a focus on tourism, economic development and social issues".

The GK Rohr Viewing Platform walkway is all but completed, with the culvert installed recently. The walking track is due to be resurfaced.

Reminder: no vehicles allowed.

The new Tooraweenah bore water supply is finally completed and the village master drainage design plan is in progress. New signage for the shire is all but complete, including for Tooraweenah and Armatree. Visitor seating installation works have commenced, planned for local churches and the caravan park.

Funding is allocated and work underway to install a RV Dump Point at the Tooraweenah Caravan Park, probably in the new year. The new Tooraweenah promotional brochure is available. A memorial sign to Len Stockings has been installed at the GK Rohr Viewing Platform, recognising the achievements in creating a road through the Warrumbungles to Coonabarabran. These are examples of the actions and outcomes achieved by council and community members of TMC.
